### Three local friends open up Peel Street Beverage Company

There's a new brewery in town.

The Peel Street Beverage Company officially opened its bricks-and-mortar location, housed at 68 Huron Street (formerly the Bitte Schon Brauhaus) in New Hamburg, on Friday, June 30.

The business was established by three long-time friends - Matt Rolleman, Darryn Nafziger and Diego Vitello - who all grew up in New Hamburg and attended Waterloo Oxford District Secondary School together.

"It was well responded to, there were lots of people out," said Rolleman, of the grand opening. "It was nice to see local support from people we know, friends and family, but also lots of new faces as well."

Beers available include a classic Pilsner,

as well as a hazy, unfiltered Pilsner, and a light local lager. There is also a cream ale available, done in collaboration with Farm League Brewing in Cambridge.

"We are also working on brewing in house a wheat beer, as well as a Marzen, which is a German style lager," said Rolleman. "They're in the tanks right now."

### Tavistock Merchants win Ontario gold

Canada Day weekend proved to be golden for the Tavistock Merchants as they brought home the title at the Ontario championship tournament in Grafton. The tournament decided which teams will be going to the Canadian Under-23 championships in Saskatoon in August.

The Merchants already have their ticket punched to the nationals as defending champions, but still wanted to perform well. In the first game, it was a pitchers' duel as Harwood's pitcher struck out 16 Merchants and Tavistock's Reese Yantzi struck out 12. The Merchants tied the game in the fifth inning, leading to Yantzi striking out the bottom side of the seventh, sending the game to extra innings. Tavistock would go on to score three in the eighth to seal a 6-3 win.

Game two saw the Merchants earn an 8-1 victory over Alvinston in five innings. Tye Boyd struck out six and gave up just two hits to set up a semi-final battle against Harwood. "We knew their bats would be hot as they just finished playing. Nate Running got the start for us, but they went up 2-0 in the top of the first, with us answering back with four in the bottom of the frame," said head coach Kevin Zehr. Harwood led 6-5 in the fourth inning, but Tavistock scored three in the fifth while Reese Yantzi came in and shut down Harwood's offence sealing a 9-6 win. "This put us in the gold medal game against the Owen Sound Selects, who had outscored their opponents 32 to one on their march to the finals," said Zehr.

The Selects took an early 1-0 lead, but it was all Merchants after that. In the bottom of the third, Thomas Baker walked and moved to second on a Jake Voisin had a sacrifice fly. Baker scored on a Mason McKay double, *Continued on page 11*

### **Erb Transport honoured with Trailblazer Purpose Award**

The Erb Group of Companies, a refrigerated transport service based in New Hamburg, won a prestigious Trailblazer Purpose Award from the Transportation Marketing and Sales Association (TMSA) for the second year in a row.

The award honours influential companies that surpass the expectations of their regular duties, and are recognized for going above and beyond for their customers and their communities at large. Award winners were announced during a June 2023 conference in Savannah, Georgia.

"As a local company, we firmly believe in going the extra mile for our community and the commitment to giving back, which has been instilled in the business since its earliest days," said Briona Lahti, spokesperson for Erb Transport.

The panel of judges, composed of industry professionals, awarded companies and individuals based on their achievements over the past 18 months. In addition to sales and marketing, submissions included recruitment, diversity, equity and inclusion in this year's winning submissions.

There were 27 brands that were given this award, with different categories including Excellence in Sales or Marketing Campaign, Purpose Award, Marketing Mountain Move of the Year, Top Brand

"Beyond refrigerated food transportation, our company's mission is to 'bring food to family's tables' in any way we can," said Briona. "This includes active participation through volunteering, making donations, and providing in-kind support, which, during times of economic turbulence and uncertainty, is important for helping our communities and those in need feel supported."

Erb Transport specializes in the transportation of refrigerated goods, which uniquely positions the business to support those facing food insecurity. Some of the work Erb Transport did in 2022 includes their ongoing partnership with Feed Ontario, where they doubled their impact in 2022 by 58.3 per cent, helping to move 7.6 million pounds of nutritious foods - the equivalent to 1,557,965 meals for families facing hunger.

Erb Transport hosted their annual company food drive, where six members of head office helped to organize some incoming products for distribution. Over the holidays, Erb Transport President and CEO Wendell Erb took a trip north with Kenora Chiefs Advisory community to help support Confederation Freezers deliver goodwill goodies and alleviate food insecurity in rural northern areas.

The Erb Group also established a partnership with the Breakfast Club of Canada, pledging a \$10,000 annual donation to help them reach children across Canada with their nutrition programs each morning, and fueling them to learn at school.

Erb employees participated in the Coldest Night of the Year walk in February, raising over \$1000 for Ray of Hope Charity, and raised \$23,800 at their annual golf tournament.

"The 'cool moves' in the community this past year have helped us pump more purpose into our everyday duties and have fueled our passion for giving back even more," said Briona.

as well as coolers made by local businesses. These include a vodka apple cooler, a gin mule, and a blueberry gin. "We tried to do everything as local or Ontario as possible," noted Rolleman.

Light snacks are available, and the Peel Street Beverage Company owners are working with local businesses to expand their menu. There's seating for about 25 people inside the space, and they are working with Wilmot Township to put a patio out front.

Rolleman said they hope to complement the existing businesses in the community, rather than compete with them.

"Our goal is to be a brewery/beverage company first, and provide some food for customers. We want to be supportive of what's going on in our community," said Rolleman.

"We're not opening a restaurant; we're not trying to take the restaurant business away from the Imperial, the Puddicombe House or Scran & Dram. We're just trying to add one more option for people who want to enjoy beer locally, or want to sit down and enjoy a nice beer in town."

Rolleman added that they have sold beer in cans and kegs to several businesses already, including Scran & Dram, EJ's, Mercer Hall in Stratford, Thirteen in Cambridge, Trail's Edge in Plattsville, and Old Galt Bottle Shop in Cambridge.

The three owners planned to start the company about two years ago, initially doing contract/virtual brewing. Their goal was to sell to restaurants, the LCBO, and the beer store, and they initially did not consider opening a brewery. Then, the opportunity arose to have a bricks-and-mortar store, so they renegotiated a lease to make it happen.

Rolleman said that they felt that Wilmot Township was underserviced in this way because there were no breweries.

"We looked at the community and said, 'We live in this community. Right now, there's nowhere in Wilmot Township to go and have a beer that's coming out of a brewery in town,'" said Rolleman. "You go to Cambridge, there's 10 breweries. You go to Kitchener/Waterloo, there's four or five breweries. Everywhere has breweries, but Wilmot Township has none.

"So there is an opportunity here - we believe we can be the brewery for the community."

For the summer, the Peel Street Beverage Company plans to be open seven days a week. "That's what we're shooting for, for the summertime," said Rolleman. "We may adjust - it's a brand new venture. We'll figure that out as we go along, if we have to make changes."

For Monday and Tuesday, they will be open starting at 4 p.m., and then for the rest of the week (Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, Saturday, Sunday), the business will open at 12 p.m. "We'd love to see everybody come out," said Rolleman. "We believe in the community - we've all been in the community for a long time, all of our lives basically. We would love to see support, and we'd love to support the community as well, and be local where we can be."

# Baden man launches business and community directory for Wilmot township residents

A Baden man has started up a community business and events directory for Wilmot Township called the Nithy.

Dubbed "Wilmot's monster community directory," the Nithy allows users to access the contact information for various businesses, including arts and entertainment, automotive, education, event services, financial services, food and dining, health and beauty, home services, hotels and travel, legal services, medical services, nightlife, pet services, professional services, real estate services, shopping, and things to do.

"I just hope that this helps people, really, at the end of the day," said Mark Wilhelm, who spearheaded the initiative. "I hope it clears things up, I hope that people will be able to use it to do what it's supposed to do, and that's connect."

There is also a special section for local talents, which may include miscellaneous types of businesses, such as dog walkers, snow shovelling, babysitting, caricature creation, and more.

"I wanted to give people a spot where they could shine there too, because they're part of the community," said Wilhelm.

Community members can also post reviews for various businesses, as well as list and contribute any upcoming events happening in Wilmot township.

Two membership levels are available to those who access the Nithy - community members and business members. Community members have the ability to share events in the community. It is the intention that only people in the Wilmot area will be members, and no personal information is resold.

The other membership option is business members, to allow business owners to share their businesses with the community. Business owners get certain tools they need, while allowing them the same abilities as a Nithy community member.

Wilhelm said he started the concept for the Nithy about two years ago. "There's a lot of behind-the-scenes work involved - especially since it's all just me," said Wilhelm. He spoke to community members, including Scott Dunstall and Lou Divita, to bounce ideas off of and gauge the community interest.

Wilhelm paid about \$1,500 out of pocket to make the directory happen. Some of these costs went to a lawyer to review the terms and conditions associated with the directory, and the use of Google

The inspiration to create a directory came from his own experience trying to find and access local services. "I think everyone in the area wants to support somebody who's local," said Wilhelm. "When you typically ask on Facebook, it gets buried in the feed if you try to go back. Unless you're really savvy with Facebook - you'll lose it."

Wilhelm attended Sheridan College in the 1990s, with dreams of becoming an animator. As the Internet became more and more prolific, he ended up making a career flip, and went into graphic design, and then ultimately into web design. Wilhelm has been doing that since 1998, currently working for a marketing firm.

"First and foremost, I'm a storyteller, and I use the graphics or the written word to tell a story," said Wilhelm. "All marketing - all any of it is - is conveying a story, whether that story is about a product, or a person, or an event, or a cause. We all use stories to connect to each other. It's universal."

The website's namesake refers to the Nith River Monster. There were strange footprints found along the Nith River in 1953. Rumours began to fly about what could be making those footprints, whether it was a person trying to scare people, or a monster. It shocked and delighted New Hamburg residents at the time.

"I knew that to get the site to work - it needed to have a good story. And so I found it only fitting that the biggest story the area ever had was all about this monster. So I adopted that," said Wilhelm.

## **Childhood cancer research fundraiser taking place in Petersburg on July 13**

Bechthold Home Improvements in Petersburg will host their 19th annual Childhood Cancer Fundraising barbecue at 1239 Notre Dame Drive on Thursday, July 13.

Every dollar raised from the event will go towards three leading child cancer care programs. Donations will be split between Scotland's Yard (Grand River Hospital), Children's Health Foundation (London's Children's Hospital) and Walk to Conquer Cancer (Princess Margaret Hospital).

"We've got to keep giving with a positive attitude that it's going to help families and

help research until we can find a cure," said organizer Warren Bechthold.

Each year, all expenses are paid for by Bechthold Home Improvements and BW Geotextiles. Hamburgers, sausage on a bun, hot dogs, and drinks will be served.

A local family affected by childhood cancer, the Austin family, had an interest in speaking at the barbecue. In addition, Warren spoke with two other families who have a child that fought and beat leukemia, will also be in attendance.

Last year's barbecue was the most money raised from the event so far, with a total of \$51,943 raised for childhood cancer

research.

"We receive donations from some of our customers and suppliers from across Canada and in the US," said Warren. "Any companies not local donate to childhood cancer charities in their area."

There were about 50 employees that came out to support that day last year from Demtool, a metal fabricator shop in Petersburg, said Warren. Some of Demtool's employees (metal fabricator in Petersburg) challenged and sponsored one employee to see how many hamburgers he could eat. The employee ate seven six ounce sirloin burgers, and the company matched the employee's donations. The employee sponsorship was roughly \$1,000, and the company matched with another \$1,000.

"They were there cheering him on," said Warren. "I don't know how he ate the seven hamburgers - just the meat alone is 42 ounces, plus the bun. And the bun would be the hard thing to get down."

In 2021, because of COVID-19 restrictions, there was no barbecue fundraiser. Instead, a donation day was held, which raised \$23,065. Come out to Petersburg to support childhood cancer Thursday, July 13 from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m.

## Wellesley township agrees to boundary road agreement with Perth East

Wellesley council agreed to a boundary road agreement with Perth East during a hybrid meeting on Tuesday, June 27.

The agreement clearly outlines each township's agreed upon responsibilities for maintenance. The boundary road that Wellesley shares with Perth East is Road 116 from Perth Line 56 to Line 86. We historically continue maintaining this road by sharing the responsibilities. No money changes hands as the maintenance costs are relatively equal for both parties," explained Director of Public Works Chris Cook. "The township has had an agreement in place for many years in Perth East, and this is just an update to the old agreement, which has expired." include routine road patrols, winter maintenance patrols, snow plowing/sanding/ salting, asphalt repair, gravel maintenance, ditching, driveway entrance permitting and approvals, road crossing culverts (that are less than three metres in span), roadside grass mowing, tree removal/trimming, shouldering and line painting.

These shared maintenance services The agreement is based on a

similar agreement that Wellesley has with Woolwich township, which was vetted through Wellesley's solicitor to ensure the interests of the township were thoroughly examined, and that no undue liability would arise if both parties satisfied their obligations.

The agreement will remain in effect until December 31, 2033.

# Late trustee's son among two new appointees to the Waterloo public school board

The Waterloo Region District School Board (WRDSB) has appointed two new trustees - Joe Meissner and Samantha Estoesta.

They will fill the vacant Woolwich-Wellesley position, along with the Waterloo-Wilmot role. The Woolwich-Wellesley was most recently held by Meissner's father, the beloved Fred Meissner, who passed away in May.

"I applied because I want to honour my father who was elected in October 2022 and recently passed away," said Joe, as to why he applied for the role.

"My dad and I often connected over our shared vision of education. We both believe that a student-centred education requires safe and inclusive classrooms, collaboration with families, and recognizing that teachers and education workers as the experts in the classroom. I felt compelled to ensure the values and goals that the community voted for were represented at the board table."

Meissner is a post secondary instructor at Wilfrid Laurier University. He has a Master of Science in Biochemistry and a

Master in Education degrees. He is passionate about education and has spent his entire career in post-secondary educational roles. He lives in Elmira, has three children in the WRDSB, and is an avid cyclist. Estoesta is a project manager, along with a long time equity, diversity and inclusion advocate, and a mother. She has over a decade of experience in equity, diversity and inclusion advocacy, along with community engagement and digital communications.

"I've been a permanent resident here of Waterloo Region since 2015," said Estoesta. "My daughter just completed junior kindergarten. So looking at the decisions that are being made at the trustee level - it's something that's going to impact my family directly for the next 13+ years."

Some issues that are particularly important to Estoesta include an improving accessibility for students, an empathetic learning environment and empowering the student voice.

Both trustees were selected through a careful selection process, which involved completing an application form before the deadline and giving a verbal presentation during a special board meeting.

There were 19 applicants selected to present to the trustees, and the swearing in ceremony for both Estoesta and Meissner occurred immediately after the vote.

## 10 years of Camp Alliwannado in Tavistock

East Zorra-Tavistock has been the site of Camp Alliwannado for a decade, and despite the concern about its future site, its owner says it's been a labour of love since day one.

Annie Rowland has owned and operated the camp at Tavistock's Queen's Park and has come back each and every summer since her teaching career took her to Sweden five years ago. Rowland said the camp is just something she's loved since attending and working at Camp Bimini. "Camp was always my passion. It was always something that gave me a lot of joy. I looked at other camps when I was in university, but I wanted to stay close to home, and I decided I wanted to create this experience for kids in this area. Every year it just kept me coming back." She added seeing the smiling kids and happy parents telling her how much their kids loved it; it confirms everything. "I'm doing this because the kids are happy, and I am happy. It has been a great experience that I could never have imagined 10 years ago."

When asked to look back on 10 years of kids having fun, Rowland said getting through COVID without interruption is the moment she is most proud of. "I was teaching in Sweden and getting calls from parents hoping the camp would be open. That turned out to be tougher than we thought it would be, but we were very fortunate to work with great staff, local public health, and Ken Wettlaufer, who was totally on board to get us up and running."

Rowland's passion for what she does is obvious, and one of the most important aspects to her is the inclusiveness the camp provides. "Its where everyone comes together. Growing up, I always felt most at home at camp. I wanted to create the same environment where we can offer that same experience to kids and to give them a place they feel they belong and to be themselves."

In addition to offering the camp for area kids, Rowland employs over thirty young people each summer, many being

former campers. "They are from Tavistock, New Hamburg, Baden, Woodstock, and Innerkip. For me, this is what I loved to do in the summer as a teenager, so to be able to create jobs where I can share my passion and hope they find it too, means a lot to me."

Camp Alliwannado is working closely with community groups to give some kids the opportunity to attend camp where otherwise they could not. Rowland said the Tavistock Assistance Program (TAP) and the Opti-Mrs. have both stepped up to help. "I think we have about 10 spaces donated to kids in the community who otherwise wouldn't have the means to afford to come. I'm really excited about that, and I hope it continues to grow. We all have the same goal which is to create experiences for kids where they feel like they fit in, and they belong."

As a sole entrepreneur, Rowland admits there have been growing pains along the way, but she said she has adapted. I felt an

immense sense of accomplishment getting through some of the hiccups. But we say the same thing at the end of every summer, we did it, we are here." Rowland added there have been many small moments over the years that make everything worthwhile. "Even this morning (Monday), there was a camper who hasn't been here for three years, and when we saw each other, our faces lit up, we hugged each other, and that connection that I made with this child four or five years ago, those are the moments that are so special to me."

#### What happens next year?

When asked about next year's Camp Alliwannado, Rowland said the addition of the new spray pad may bring some new challenges, but she said she is up for it. "We are working with East Zorra-Tavistock to see what is possible for next year. We are scheduled to meet with the EZT team in September once the spray pad details are better understood and to learn if the pavilion and site will remain available to the camp in 2024. We will keep our parents and campers informed once we know more."

One thing is certain, and that is if Camp Alliwannado isn't in Tavistock next year, it will create a big hole in parents' plans for their kids, particularly those whose children attend all eight weeks. "Every year, we are met with increasing demand from local families. Almost all weeks are at capacity of over 100 campers within 24 hours of launching registration in January. Our goal is to continue offering our services here in Tavistock," she added.

# Area women attend Associated Country Women of the World

Triennial Conference in Malaysia

Two area Women's Institute members, Anne Innes from Oxford County and Nancy Birss from Wilmot Township, were among forty Canadian women (twenty of whom were from Ontario) who attended the international conference in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia in May. This was Nancy's first ACWW conference and Anne's fifth conference. In all, there were about 450 attendees from around the world, belonging to Women's Institutes and other women's agricultural and educational societies.

The long journey (with over 20 hours of flying time each way) began with fifteen of the Canadian WI women spending the first three days of a two week tour, in Singapore, followed by a wonderful educational and cultural tour of Malaysia prior to the conference. The tour group experienced visits to a couple of Indigenous villages, a tea plantation in the Malaysian highlands, batik crafters, and several Malaysian, Indian and Chinese temples representing the three cultures in Malaysia.

The international conference of the Associated Country Women of the World (ACWW) is held every three years and has previously been held in places such as Australia, England, India, USA and Canada. The Malaysian Women's Institute of Pahang area near Kuala Lumpur offered six years ago to be the host country for 2023. Since that time, their star member became Queen Azizah of Malaysia as her husband had become king. In Malaysia, the kingship is rotated every five years between nine royal families, which are Sultan-led states. The Sultan gives up his 'sultanship' for a five-year period to become king and then usually returns to being Sultan. Thus at this particular conference, the King and Queen of Malaysia officially opened the conference, and Queen Azizah entertained conference attendees, among other guests, to dinner and entertainment at the palace. What an amazing evening that was!

The ACWW has been in existence over 90 years and represents nine million women from 84 countries around the world. ACWW's mission is to empower women and amplify women's voices around the world and seeks to encourage and support projects that provide sustainable economic programs for women, especially in third world countries. "Rural Women are the backbone of families, communities, and nations, but they suffer the worst impacts of climate change and conflict, go unheard in legislation, and remain unprotected and unsupported. Associated Country Women of the World exists to change that." https://acww.org.uk/

ACWW's theme for the next triennium is Sustainable Growth for the Future. The new focus is to fund and promote longer sustainable projects, in many cases helping women to start their own initiatives for sustainable economic independence to support their families and communities with climate-sensitive agriculture, thus ensuring greater community impact for the women most at risk of being left behind.

Many of the new projects will provide sustainable reproducing seeds, thus allowing for seed security for many women. 'Rural

Women in Action' is not just a slogan.

The World President, Magdie de Kock, from South Africa, was re-elected for a second three-year term. Anne Innes was elected to the worldwide 13 member Board of Trustees as Chairman of the Food and Agriculture Committee. Congratulations Anne! Anne had been a member of ACWW's United Nations Committee for the past four years and in March of this year attended the United Nations Commission on the Status of Women in New York. The previous chair of the ACWW UN Committee, Marie Kenny, of PEI, was elected Canada Area Chair to ACWW. "ACWW will continue to use its Consultative Status with the United Nations and its Agencies to amplify the voices of Rural Women, and highlight the issues they raise at the international level.'

ACWW, as an international organization, brings together many women's organizations. Women's Institute (WI) was essentially the basis for this organization. Adelaide Hunter Hoodless, along with Erland and Janet Lee, started WI in 1897 in Stoney Creek, Ontario. What began as an organization to educate rural women about domestic household issues has grown into an international organization. Branches exist in many rural communities and areas across Canada and in many countries around the world, providing education and social meetings for members, and often advocating for public policy change. WI advocated for painted lines on highways years ago, flashing lights on school buses, and recycling programs, to name a few.

WI, like many organizations, has seen its membership shrink over the past few years, especially during covid. However, WI is reviving and changing its image and programs to reflect the needs and interests of today's women. # **Community Futures celebrates a milestone**

Community Futures Oxford is celebrating 30 years of supporting small businesses and community economic development in the county.

The organization recently held its annual general meeting and since inception, it has distributed more than \$24 million in loans and equity to 417 businesses that were starting or growing in the community. This directly impacted 3,294 jobs. Since 1993, 368 grants have been awarded to the tune of \$1.3 million.

General Manager Alan Simm said things have changed over 30 years. "We went from one loan fund to now having three. We went from renting an office of 1600 square feet to owning a 2700 square foot building. We now have a total of four staff, and the loan limit went from \$75,000 in year one to \$300,000."

Community Futures Oxford specializes in providing term loans to small businesses. Entrepreneurs can access an Investment Fund, Sand Plains Community Development Fund, or the Future Oxford Legacy Fund. "All three funds are available to small business clients. They are separate and have different eligibility criteria. Financing in amounts up to \$300,000 is available from two of them, and up to \$100,000 is available from the Future Oxford Legacy Fund," added Simm.

Two funds were added in 2020 in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. The Regional Relief and Recovery Fund (RRRF) and the Oxford Economic Stimulus Fund (OESF). "The RRRF, which is now closed, provided loans of up to \$60,000 to businesses and

not-for-profit organizations affected by the economic impacts of COVID-19. The RRRF was funded by the Government of Canada via FedDev Ontario." The OESF was fully disbursed this past year and is now closed. Simm said it was a partnership with Oxford County, Oxford Connection, and Community Futures Oxford.

In addition to funding streams, Simm said the organization can help entrepreneurs with business start-up and business planning questions in one-on-one advisory sessions. "Personalized business planning advice is provided by a qualified business consultant, and we have businesses seminars. Topics on improving business management skills are presented by guest speakers who are experts in their respective fields." He added a lot of information is available to clients interested in starting a business and on their website at www. cfoxford.ca.

As for what is on deck for the future, Simm said the Community Futures board wants to explore an entrepreneurial Hub model, something trending across the province. "The primary objective will be to explore the feasibility of an entrepreneurship Hub or Hubs. Innovation Guelph was engaged as a consultant to perform this study, and they have provided an in-depth report with recommendations." He added the organization must understand and stay connected to the emerging needs of the community. "Our ongoing communication will provide us with the opportunity to reach entrepreneurial individuals and families who have exciting ideas to further strengthen the county through their business ventures."

#### 2023 Award Winners

Community Futures Oxford also presented their annual awards of excellence to three recipients. The Entrepreneur of the Year went to Jodi Pendry from Terra Nova Nordic Spa just south of Hickson. "I am honoured to receive the award. The recognition is humbling. It takes a lot of perseverance, hard work, and support. I can't forget the great staff I have who have created a space like ours. I love the challenge and so far, the outcomes. I suppose this is what entrepreneurship is all about," said Pendry.

The Young Entrepreneur of the Year was won by Jessica Eterno of Sew Stylish Wedding Works in Ingersoll. Eterno said it is great to be a part of Oxford County and the amazing community of Ingersoll. "I really appreciate all the support we have received throughout the years. I am grateful to Community Futures Oxford for allowing me to be able to continue the legacy of Sew Stylish."

The winner of the Community Economic Development Project of the Year is the Oxford Invitational Youth Robotics Challenge.


### **Tavistock Merchants win Ontario gold**

Slowly but surely, I'm reading through the past pages of the Tavistock Gazette (est. 1895). Within this weekly column I'd like to share with you some of my findings.

#### July 3-10, 2013 Edition (10 years ago)

Kyle Waymouth of Stratford and Kyle Charron of Barrie were winners in the 30th Annual Southwestern Ontario Open Fiddle and Stepdance Championships held in Tavistock this past weekend on June 28-29.

Tavistock Minor Ball has their first ever representative at the Canadian Championships. This past weekend the Midget boys finished third at the Ontario Amateur Softball Association's Elimination Tournament in Napanee. Tavistock is becoming well-known in the fastball world as a powerhouse of young talent.

#### July 2-9, 2003 Edition (20 years ago)

For the third consecutive year now, Tavistock will be the site of the Southwestern Ontario Fiddle and Stepdance Championships and a local stepdance group will be there to try and repeat their winning performance. Last year's junior group winners, Denim and Lace, this years consists of local teens - Rebecca Walker, 14, of Tavistock; John Coulthard, 14, of St. Pauls; and Dawn Marie Harris. 12. of Mitchell.

A beautiful, warm summer's day greeted the foursome of Judy Neeb, Linda Schumm, Cathie McGonigle, and Sue Murray for the 2003 Longest Day of Golf on June 16 at the Tavistock Golf Course. # **Two new police service dogs join the Waterloo Regional Police Service**

The Waterloo Regional Police Service (WRPS) welcomed two new police service dogs to its canine unit.

After collecting more than 600 name suggestions from the Waterloo Region community, the Canine Unit officially named one of the dogs River in honour of the Grand River and the 50th anniversary of the police service.

The second dog, officially named Milo, was named by the woodworking students at Monsignor Doyle Catholic Secondary School after the police service partnered with the class to build new training obstacles for the canine unit.

River is a one-year-old German Shepherd and Belgian Malinios cross and Milo is a one-year-old German Shepherd. Both were born in Czechia.

"On behalf of the police service, we are proud to officially welcome our newest members, River and Milo," said Mark Crowell, Chief of Police, in a release. "River and Milo join fellow canine team members, Ranger and Nicho, and will be valuable assets to the service, assisting in many types of investigations."

Before reporting for duty, River and Milo will complete a 16-week training program. During the program, they will be taught obedience and agility while learning how to conduct proper tracking, property/evidence searches, building searches, handler protection, and criminal apprehension.

The WRPS has used police canines since 1986. The canines are trained to support officers in tracking and apprehending suspects, locating missing persons, recovering stolen or missing property or evidence, and detecting hidden contraband, such as drugs, firearms, ammunition, and currency.

### Introducing our new website



Websites can be tricky. And they are also very unique; there are so many different ways to build and maintain them. I know enough about them to be dangerous, as I ran a web design company from 2011 to 2017.

Prior the merger of the Wilmot Post and Tavistock Gazette, the two websites for the Post and Gazette were polar opposites in their construction. Bill Gladding built the Gazette website the old-fashioned way, from HTML code (which I tried my best to continue, for awhile...) while a New Hamburg based designer used his expertise to build a modern (and OCNA award-winning) website for the Post which we continued with post-merger.

With none of the above designer options available to build a new website for our Woodstock Ingersoll Echo newspaper, I got in touch with good friend Natalie Moore – proprietor of Moore Creative Consulting in Stratford.

Together, we brainstormed – and found that what we needed wasn't another completely different website for the Woodstock Ingersoll paper, but a onestop-shop where people could access either the news for their specific community, or for the broader region if desired.



"Moore Creative Consulting's goal was to create a clean and crisp website for Grant Haven (at www.granthaven.com) so that we could ensure local news is at the forefront," said Natalie. "Each decision we made considered not only ease of use for

Grant Haven team members, but above all, ease of use for readers. Bringing all Grant Haven papers together in one hub did just that. Now, you have access to all local news from reporters in one place instead of jumping sites on the web. Readers can also see important headlines that impact not just one area but Stratford, St. Marys, Tavistock, Woodstock and Ingersoll all in one place right from the home page."

One of the things that I appreciated the most about Natalie's involvement with the project was, because she took the time to understand our business so well, she didn't have to wait for me to write up a detailed plan for the site. Based on our planning conversation over a cup of coffee, she was able to move forward straight-away because she knew what I wanted the website to do... even if I didn't have the time to actually type out the words.

"Our team had a fantastic time working on this new website and we're excited to have helped make finding and reading local news even easier!" Natalie added.

I started this article by sharing my background in websites because I know that sometimes, things are difficult and sites don't always work as intended. Some of our users have experienced issues with www.wilmotpost.ca correctly forwarding to the new website. If you are in this small group, hopefully GoDaddy (where our site is hosted) will have it fixed by the time you read this. But if not, simply visit www. granthaven.com and you'll be able to click on the Wilmot-Tavistock Gazette link.





### OH, THE PLACES WE'LL GO: A lot of history on "a rock in the middle of nowhere"

Travelling by car through the Florida Keys on Highway 1, the "Overseas Highway", is probably my favourite drive anywhere in the world. You pass through interesting towns with tropical ambience – Key Largo, Islamorada, Marathon, and many more island communities and you encounter innumerable bridges, including the famed "Seven Mile Bridge" that stretches over seven miles of ocean.

#### It is stunningly beautiful.

Being caught up in that beauty is probably why I never really noticed a tiny coral "key" adjacent to the Seven Mile Bridge. Pigeon Key is not worth noticing if you are looking for sheer, dramatic beauty. But it turns out, this small island is a rich repository of history that lies at the heart of what the Florida Keys are today.

Paying visitors arrive via the cute little Pigeon Key train which takes you to the island. There, you will be welcomed for a lengthy but enthralling tour of the island where you learn the story of Henry Flagler and his railway to Key West. Because during construction of that ill-fated railway, Pigeon Key was a key (pun intended) staging point for the railroad construction project. And this island, which you can cross from side to side in a four-minute walk, was home to 400 workers. Our guide – "Just call me C.T., everybody does" – admitted that, "We're a rock in the middle of nowhere but there is a surprising amount of history on this island."

So – about this railway. The name "Henry Flagler" pops up everywhere in the history of Florida. Flagler, born to a poor family in 1830, became a rich American industrialist. He was a partner with John D. Rockefeller in Standard Oil. C.T. told us that Flagler had a contradictory reputation: "Vicious in business – he'd squash you like a bug – but the very opposite in his personal life where he was kind and generous and empathetic."

This vicious, kind man first came to Florida in the 1880s and he saw the potential in a state that was then, mostly mosquito-infested swampland. His story is deserving of a book but the quick version is that Flagler built a railway to St. Augustine and then continued south to Daytona and eventually Miami. He built hotels (great facilities still in use today as schools, as well as historic hotels).

When the Panama Canal opened in 1914, Flagler saw the potential for a deep-water port to serve the United States and the closest one was in Key West. The problem was that Key West is an island at the end of a series of islands with no land transportation connecting it to the continental United States. That constitutes about 194 kilometers without land transportation. And except for Key West, then a boomtown of about 20,000, the population of the Keys was about 1,000 in total.

The solution? C.T. described it this way: "Henry Flagler reached into his pocket and pulled out a railroad."

It was an astonishing feat – building a railroad over the ocean, anchoring the line on the islands of the keys but stretching over many lengths of sea including the seven-mile stretch that includes Pigeon Key.

The project employed thousands and 400 of them were based on Pigeon Key. The buildings still standing (many have been demolished) date back to that era when hundreds of men ate, slept and worked from this home base.

When Flagler first envisioned the project, the experts he consulted told him he was crazy. His answer? "We're going to Key West."

And he did. While Pigeon Key was perhaps the biggest camp, there were actually 82 work camps all along the Keys, all building their section of the project.

Flagler stated his vision in 1905; on January 22, 1912, the first train to reach Key West pulled into the station with an aging Henry Flagler on board. C.T. stated it dramatically: "For the first time ever, Key West heard the scream of steam." Flagler was greeted by ten thousand

cheering residents including bands and choirs, school kids and dignitaries galore. Henry was a hero.

He was also ill. Henry Flagler passed away on May 20, 1913 just over a year after his final entrepreneurial triumph. His impact on Key West is honoured today by a life-sized statue of Flagler seated on a bench in front of the former railway station. His Key West hotel, Casa Marina, continues to be a popular and pricey home away from home for visitors today.

The railroad did not stand the test of time or tempest. About 65 kilometers of track around Islamorada were destroyed in a tragic 1935 hurricane that also caused the death of over 400 people, many riding on a northbound train racing to escape the storm.

The railway was in dire straits. The death blow that sent it into receivership came when the company could not pay a large bill, ironically to Standard Oil, where Flagler was once a part-owner.

But the precedent had been set. No railway was ever to run again through the Keys, but a highway was built using many of the same bridges. That highway today is perhaps my favourite drive anywhere.

Thank you, Henry Flagler.

### THE PUBLISHERS DESK: Play stupid games, win stupid prizes

As a board member of the Ontario Community Newspapers Association, it's been well over a year ago since I first heard of the lobbying taking place to force Facebook and Google to pay Canadian publishers for the news stories that are shared on their platforms.

While "sure, it would be nice" to have some of the extra dollars that these mega companies have lying around, I couldn't get over the fact that the idea of them paying us was... stupid.

Sitting in on this conference call, I remember being the lone person saying to the group, "This doesn't make any sense to me."

"Each week, we share our online newspaper on Facebook, and we also share our top stories. This is our choice. Facebook didn't make us share our news stories here, in fact it's nice for us that Facebook provides this platform for us to connect with a wider audience. Why should they have to pay me for that?"

As you may have heard, this whole issue came up in a big way last week, with the Government of Canada's Bill C-18 being passed into law. The bill, dubbed the Online News Act, required Facebook and Google to pay Canadian publishers for showing links to news. And not surprisingly, Facebook and Google don't want to do this. And why should they?

Instead, they both came out with strong statements against the Canadian legislation, saving that if they are forced to pay for the links to Canadian news sites... well then, they won't provide those links at all.

Therefore, in roughly six months' time, unless something changes, we will no longer be able to post articles or links to the PDF version of our newspaper on Facebook, nor will our articles be shared through Google News. As a company who is mainly focused on our print product, this really isn't that big of a deal for the Wilmot-Tavistock Gazette, but for many other news companies, it is a devastating development.

Again, I don't blame Facebook or Google for this. Instead, I

blame lobbyists with unrealistic goals, and I mostly blame the federal government for pushing through bad legislation that they didn't realize the ramifications of.

The best thing that could happen from here is that the Liberals back down, admit that they overstepped, and reverse the law. However, I don't think many politicians have a habit of admitting when they're wrong.

So, what'll happen is that, in a country where news organizations are already struggling, a short-sighted government bill managed to make things much worse.


