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# 19th annual childhood cancer barbecue in Petersburg raises over \$34,000

Attendees hear from those touched by childhood cancer

The 19th Annual Childhood Cancer Barbecue in Petersburg was a success this year, raising more than \$34,000, and drawing in about 500 people. The funds are split between Scotland's Yard (Grand River Hospital), Children's Health Foundation (London's Children's Hospital) and Walk to Conquer Cancer (Princess Margaret Hospital).

The event took place at Bechthold Home Improvements at 1239 Notre Dame

Drive from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Thursday, July 13.

"It was a terrific day all the way around," said organizer Warren Bechthold. "When you can help somebody - whether you know them or don't know them - that's what we've got to do when we have the resources and ability.

"I can't stress enough - thank you to the volunteers that help do the barbecue and to the community and businesses that support us. If it wasn't for them, we wouldn't be."

Food available at the barbecue included hamburgers (six ounce beef from Stemmler's Meats in Heidelberg) for \$7, a cheeseburger for \$8, sausages from Krug's Meat Market in Tavistock for \$6, a jumbo hot dog for \$5, pop for \$2, ice cream treats for \$2, as well as water and juice for \$1.

There were tents set up to provide some shade, one of which was donated by the

## New Tavistock spray pad planned for a 2024 opening

The Township of East Zorra-Tavistock will open its first spray pad in 2024 in Tavistock's Queen's Park. The township says it will offer a unique and accessible play area for families that expands the community's outdoor recreation options.

EZT Mayor Phil Schaefer said it feels great to add the facility to the recreation options locally. "Our communities are growing, and our citizens have told us that outdoor recreation is an important part of community life." The project will not cost taxpayers a cent thanks to support from local businesses and residents, and a grant. "Through the support of our residents, Saputo as a corporate donor, and the Trillium fund, we are able to take this key step forward in expanding the use and enjoyment of EZT's wonderful outdoor spaces, which is a key goal of the Parks and Recreation Master Plan."

Spray pads are non-slip aquatic play areas with no standing water that instead feature water sprinklers, sprayers, nozzles, and games that are motion-activated or on limited run times. Spray pads are a safe, low-cost, and low-maintenance alternative to outdoor pools while supporting childhood development through socialization, developing motor skills, and learning through play.

The new spray pad was requested by a citizen delegation to council in October 2019. The \$250,000 project budget is supported through a 2022 Ontario Trillium Foundation grant of \$150,000 and community fundraising efforts of over \$100,000 to date, including a \$35,000 corporate donation by Saputo. The spray pad aligns with the Township of East Zorra-Tavistock's Parks and Recreation

Optimist Club of New Hamburg.

Attendees also heard from special guests who have been personally touched by childhood cancer. This included Melanie Austin, a 17-year-old New Hamburg resident who was diagnosed with leukemia; as well as Brian Santos and Joy Stewart, who began Scotland's Yard after their daughter, Scotland (Scottie) was diagnosed with a rare form of blood cancer.

"I've been completely overwhelmed with the amount of support from friends,

family and even strangers," said Melanie during her speech. "You might have seen all of the orange ribbons up around New Hamburg while you were driving around. Well, they are in support of me - to me and my mom, it's like a big hug when you drive around town.

'Cancer is an awful disease that affects so many people and their loved ones. It puts your whole life on hold; it makes you miss out on some really fun experiences."

In his speech, Brian explained his personal experience with childhood cancer

as well as the inspiration behind starting Scotland's Yard. Scotland's Yard aims to raise \$50-million to improve pediatric care in the Waterloo Region.

Brian's and Joy's daughter, Scottie, is three-and-a-half years old now, and has been fighting cancer for most of her life. Scottie is doing well now, but for two years, it was "very difficult" for the family.

"As it stands now, families that have a child that's fighting cancer in Waterloo Region - they have to travel for most of the lifesaving treatment that they need,"

said Brian. "They have to go to London, Hamilton or Toronto to get the chemotherapy or radiation that they need. And that burden of travel is a lot.

Brian said that throughout the family's experience with childhood cancer, they made over 200 trips to Hamilton - which amounted to over 25,000 kilometres.

"The dream with this initiative is to bring pediatric cancer care to Waterloo Region so families don't have to travel.

Bechthold said this event will continue to be held until there is a cure for cancer.

The Township of East Zorra-Tavistock Council awarded the contract to construct the new spray pad to Openspace Solutions Inc. at a July 5 council meeting. Construction is scheduled to take place in the fall of 2023.





# Successful start for Cruizin' on the Pond Baden

Cruizin' on the Pond in Baden, a local classic car show that draws in hundreds of visitors from across Ontario, is having a successful run so far this year.

Last year, out of 14 scheduled Wednesdays. the event was only able to go on seven times due to rain, according to organizer Helen Rempel. This year, they haven't missed a night.

The event takes place every Wednesday throughout the summer months, starting on the first Wednesday of June and ending on the last Wednesday in August. This year, those days fall on June 7 and August 30. Those dates are often the busiest nights of the whole summer, with about 370 cars attending those nights. On average, there are about 150 to 200 cars.

Helen took over running the event from Ron and Marlene Weber about two years ago. "We have cars from Exeter, Owen Sound, Hamilton, Burlington - it seems like every week, there's somebody new," said Helen. She added that visitors also come from all over, including Wilmot Township, Wellesley, Tavistock and Kitchener

The event has grown since its inception more than 15 years ago. It was originally located in the Baden plaza, before moving to the Castle Kilbride, then taking place at the corner of Mill Street and Foundry

Ron and Marlene ran the event for years, while Helen did DJ'ing at the event for about three years. After the COVID-19 pandemic hit, the event was cancelled in 2020 and 2021. "It got easy for him to say

he didn't want to do it anymore, because for two years, he didn't, and I guess that felt good," explained Helen with a laugh.

Helen added that Ron had asked whether she would like to run the event. "It was a big decision. It's your whole summer - but we couldn't let it go, because it was so big and we've got so many nice comments."

A woman from Paris approached Helen about two weeks ago, and told her that she started coming to the event last year, and has never missed a night since.

"She told me it's the best show. I asked her why, and she told me that the people are number one - the people are so friendly," said Helen. "The location - people love it by the pond. And the different styles of cars - there are unique cars every single week that nobody has ever seen before."

The event is a big community effort. The previous owners of Baden Feed - Tim Scheerer and Roger Scheerer - rent out the field to Helen field for free. "Every week, they have it mowed and cleaned up,"

M & G Portables Inc. based in New Hamburg, provides portapotties for those attending the event. "George Milligan and his son, Ron - they bring them every Wednesday morning, whether it's rain or shine," said Helen.

Donations are accepted at some events, which are then split between the land owner and M & G Portables Inc. "People are very generous - car people are awesome," said Helen.

There are door prizes given out every Wednesday, along with a 50/50 draw, with all the proceeds of the draw given to the Make-A-Wish Foundation. The Make-A-Wish Foundation is a not-for-profit that helps to fulfill the wishes of kids with critical illnesses.

The Petersburg Optimist Club provides food for the event, including burgers, fries, hot dogs and cold drinks. Lots of local groups stop by, including the New Hamburg Optimist Club, and the North Easthope Tractor Club. Christine Ramseyer also attends with her ice cream truck every week

"I could not accomplish this without the help of my crew," said Helen. "Setting up, tearing own, garbage and recycle helpers, car park guys are the greatest managing to get all those cars organized, registration and much more. I have the right people in the right places."

Cruizin at the Pond Baden events take place every Wednesday at the corner of Mill Street and Foundry Street from 4 p.m. until dusk.

# The Gurtovyis, a Ukrainian family of four, celebrate their one year anniversary of coming to Wellesley

The Gurtovyi family have recently celebrated their one year anniversary of moving to Wellesley, Canada, to escape from the war in Ukraine.

Over the past year, the family of four has accomplished plenty. Tetiana, Eugene, and their two daughters, Liza and Angelina, first came to Canada when they moved into a home on Nithbank Road on June 8. The property is owned by couple Lisa Weiler Haskins and Rich Hamming.

"They lived with us for four months and in that time accomplished so much," said Lisa and Richard. "They were great house guests. Easy to get along with, always pitching in to help, and, lucky for us, Tetiana is an amazing cook and often shared meals and treats with us.

In October, a three-bedroom rental unit owned by the couple became available on Crab Apple Court. Lisa and Richard offered it to the family, and they officially moved on October 2, 2022.

There were several Wellesley residents - including Lisa and Richard, as well as

Wellesley Mayor Joe Nowak and his wife Barb - that helped them out with the move, such as moving furniture and household

'We are very grateful to the residents of Wellesley who helped us with things and household items," said the Gurtovyi family.

Tetiana and Eugene now work at Toyota Boshoku in Elmira. After graduating from Waterloo Oxford District Secondary School, Liza plans to get a full-time job. Angelina will attend Wellesley PS in the eighth grade.

On April 19, Tetiana's parents' house was damaged by shelling from the Russian army. They were safe at that time, and did not live in their house. The parents' house is located in a 10-kilometre zone from the border with Russia.

"It is very dangerous to live there! There are shellings there every day," said the Gurtovyi family. "The situation in Ukraine is very difficult and we do not yet see the end of this situation. Every day we talk to our parents and they talk about the terrible situation there! There is shelling every

day. Russia is destroying entire cities and villages of Ukraine."

The Gurtovyi family said they do not see the possibility of returning to Ukraine, and that they are grateful for their life in

"We were well received by the Wellesley community," they said. "Wellesley is home to incredibly kind and positive people. Our family loves communication, getting to know each other and we like to attend various events and holidays."

They have relatives left in Ukraine -Eugene's parents and Tetiana's parents live there. Tetiana's brother also staved there - he is visually impaired and lives with his parents

"The war in Ukraine is terrible because the Russian army behaves like a terrorist army and destroys entire cities and villages," said the Gurtovyi family. "A lot of peaceful children, women and pensioners are dying. Now we are very worried about the Zaporizhzhia nuclear power plant. Russian terrorists have mined it and can detonate it at any moment. This is very

They said that all Ukrainians, regardless of where they are in Ukraine or abroad, want an early peace and victory.

Ukrainians are arriving on Canada-Ukraine authorization for emergency travel (CUAET) visas, which provide them with an opportunity to work and study in Canada. This means they are not entitled to housing and other financial support offered through traditional refugee


"With the support of friends, family and the Wellesley community, we have been able to provide housing for three additional Ukrainian families," said Lisa and Rich, "We are thankful to be in a position to provide a safe place to land while they get their paperwork in order, find jobs and secure permanent housing.

A police investigation is underway after a tool shed at the Zion Philipsburg Lutheran Church Philipsburg was broken into over this past

Chairman of the church, Murray Ziegler, said that weed eaters, gas, gas cans and other garden equipment were all stolen. The unknown person(s) used bolt cutters to force open the lock on the tool shed.

The incident occurred sometime between 9 p.m. on July 14 and 12 p.m. on July 15. It was the church groundskeeper who noticed that the shed had been broken into; then the Waterloo Regional Police Service (WRPS) were notified. The groundskeeper cuts the lawn around the church and cemetery about once or twice a week.

The biggest concern was who broke in and stole from a cemetery. That's the biggest disappointment. The material things we can replace all that," said Ziegler.

He added that there has been plenty of community support following the incident. "The community here is wonderful. I already have a lawn mower donated by a local business. We have lots of good people in our local area that are helping out."

"It's good news to know that the community is there for you."

There have since been security measures installed at the toolshed, including solar lights.

In a news release issued on Sunday, July 16, the WRPS said they had received three reports of break ins over the course of two days at cemeteries in Wilmot and Woolwich townships

In all incidents, outdoor power equipment

such as grass trimmers, push mowers and lawn tractors were targeted. Property owners and property keepers are encouraged to ensure all storage buildings are locked and that valuable property is further secured.

# Former K9 owner shares thoughts on losing a dog in the line of duty

Tavistock resident Mike McKay may not have lost his police dog while doing his job, but he can certainly empathize with the Woodstock officer who did

Police service dog Taz, a K9 with the Woodstock Police Service, responded to a call to help the Stratford Police Service with a drug-related investigation on July 3. While conducting a search, Taz and another dog, PSD Striker, both appeared to ingest drugs. Narcan was administered to both, and they were rushed to a veterinarian clinic. Taz did not survive while Striker was released and went home

McKay was a member of the K9 unit with the Waterloo Regional Police from 2006 to 2014. He said during his time with a police dog fentanyl was just emerging as an issue among drug users. "We were just really careful. There were actually searches we wouldn't do if there was fentanyl involved. At that time there wasn't Narcan, but we did have an injectable just in case the dog ingested something."

McKay had the same canine partner for all of the eight years he was in the K9 unit, something that is very rare by today's standards. "Storm was a Hungarian Shepherd, a working line of dogs. He became part of the family. What people don't understand is a K9 is an attack dog. Shepherds are the closest animal to a wild dog or a wolf. They are very pack oriented and very loyal to their pack." He added Storm would see McKay's family as his pack. "He became very close with us, and he would do anything asked of him. That's why they are such good police dogs,



their loyalty. They are also energetic and extremely brave. That's what makes them train well too. Try getting a dog to climb a ladder or run through tubes where they can't see the end. They just trust you." He added that during his time in the unit, he probably spent more time with Storm than he did with his own family. "That's the commitment it requires. People think it's all fun and games, but when you think about it you are relegated to that K9 for the rest of its life, 24 hours a day and seven days a week. So when I was off duty I would have to do something with Storm

Storm retired because of age, and he ended up with some disc and other health issues, but McKay said he lived to the age of 13, quite old for a Shepherd. "He lived with us until the day he died. The problem is they are trained to bite people. Either the handler has to keep them, or they need to go to another experienced handler who knows

what they are getting. You can't just give them to anyone. They are professional biters is what they are." He said he doesn't know of any handlers who haven't kept their dog after leaving a police service. McKay also left the unit once Storm retired. "It's a young person's thing. If they go over fences, you have to go over fences. If they go through water, you go through water. It's very physical and that is actually what ends many K-9's careers. Workplace injuries."

Woodstock Police have not released the name of the K9 officer who was Taz's handler, but McKay said he can appreciate what a devastating loss it would be. "It would be similar to losing your partner. It will be tough on him for sure. He lost his partner, and he was counting on the dog being around for a while. They usually start training when they are a year old, so it was likely right in its prime. They don't get really good until they are in their third or fourth

Taz joined the Woodstock Police Service K9 Unit and began his training in 2021 and was officially deployed in 2022, allowing Striker to begin transitioning into more of a community service-oriented role. A statement from Woodstock Police said "Taz was young but respected throughout the K9 community, as he had developed into an outstanding detection dog. In his short but successful career, Taz assisted with a number of arrests, drug and weapons investigations, missing persons investigations, and community service engagements. Taz was well-loved and cared for and will be greatly missed by his family, the entire Woodstock Police Service, his K9 friends, and all of the groomers, vets, and therapists who worked closely with him."

OPP lays more than 7,000 charges during campaign

Drivers of passenger (and other non-commercial) vehicles racked up 6,180 of the charges, while commercial vehicle drivers were issued 904 of the offence notices. Speeding, distracted, careless and impaired driving, following too closely, and other unsafe/illegal moving violations were among the offences on the part of both non-commercial and commercial drivers.

Among other commercial driver charges were those related to speed limiters, defective equipment, unsecured load, unsafe lane changes and improper documents.

Operation Safe driver is an annual, national campaign founded by the Commercial Vehicle Safety Alliance, which ran from July 9 to July 15.





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

# Tavistock's Justin Wagler goes pro as a Certified **Athletic Trainer**

Local sports players and enthusiasts from the Tavistock and New Hamburg area get educated in many ways - not only at school but also at area arenas, soccer fields, and baseball diamonds, to name a few.

This is a story about a 25-year-old area athlete named Justin Wagler (son of Brian and Heidi Wagler), who has broken into professional baseball in a trainer's

There have been many area athletes with the Wagler family name that have all done well in many sports, but Justin has been working hard at everything he set out to do and more.

After many years of hard work and dedication, Justin recently has been working with Major League Baseball's Detroit Tigers organization at the Triple-A level, just one step below the Major League

Justin grew up in Tavistock and attended Tavistock Public School, and at the same time, played hockey and baseball in the Tavistock minor hockey, and Tavistock minor ball associations.

He said he was fortunate to be a part of a lot of great teams, and played with lots of great teammates, many of whom are still good friends of his.

Some accomplishments of the teams he was involved with, include a gold medal in softball at the Ontario summer games hosted in Toronto in 2012. A gold medal at the U-16 men's eastern Canadian softball championship in Sainte-Perpetue, Quebec, in 2013, where he was also named the tournament MVP.

In 2016, Tayistock hosted the U21 men's Canadian Fast-Pitch championships, and Wagler was named the tournament all star utility player. In 2019, the team earned a silver medal at the U21 men's Canadian Fast-Pitch championships in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan.

The young sports enthusiast went to Waterloo-Oxford District Secondary School in Baden and played various high school sports, including volleyball, basketball, football, and slow pitch.

Justin's education following high school included going to the University of Waterloo to study kinesiology. He chose that because of its broad discipline, and he was looking for something to combine his love of sports and science. He says, in some ways, he's "not sure why it took so long to realize that athletic training was such a great combination of his two passions" - baseball and hockey.

After Waterloo, he had the opportunity to go to the University of Michigan at Ann Arbor, for his master of science in athletic training degree. During his time there, he got to work with the women's softball and men's ice hockey teams, as well as a rotation at Ann Arbour Pioneer high school.

He had the opportunity to do an immersive,

clinical rotation with the Detroit Tigers, and spent some time with their AAA affiliate - the Toledo Mud Hens. That same summer, he also completed an internship with the MLB - Arizona Diamondbacks organization.

When Wagler graduated from the University of Michigan last December, he ended up passing his board of certification exam to become a "certified athletic trainer" and says it was great timing because he was then able to start his current job as a seasonal assistant, athletic trainer with the Detroit Tigers organization in AAA Toledo, Ohio.

Just last month, he wrote his Canadian Athletic Therapist Association (CATA), national certification exam, and is currently awaiting the results so that he can become a certified athletic therapist in Canada, as well as a certified athletic trainer in the United States.

In a recent interview from his parents' home near New Hamburg, Wagler says "that working with the Detroit Tigers organization at the Triple-A level is unique, because as you're just one step below the major leagues, at any one time, one of the players may be called up to the "Tiger" organization.

He says, "it's a unique chance to work with major league players on rehab assignments, veteran players who have experience playing in the MLB, and younger players and prospects, who are working their way up through the minor leagues to the major league level."

He goes on to say "that he likes the idea of working in professional baseball, because it provides an opportunity for athletic trainers as well as to learn, grow, and develop skills and experience, to eventually work at higher levels within teams and organizations."

Wagler goes on to say that "he enjoys working in Toledo specifically - because he finds it similar to Tavistock in terms of being rich in both hockey and baseball." Toledo has a minor-league baseball team in the Toledo Mud Hens and a minor-league hockey team in the Toledo Walleye of the ECHL, an affiliate of the Detroit Red Wings.

The very humble young man that Justin Wagler is, can be partially attributed to his Tavisock and New Hamburg roots, along with his strong faith and family ties.

He says he has had the opportunity to meet and work with a lot of different people from various places around the world, but when they ask him where he is from, he still tells them he's from Tavistock, Ontario, Canada - even though he doesn't expect many people to be familiar with his small town in southwestern Ontario.

One can say that Justin Wagler has made his hometown proud, and says he's excited about where opportunities may take him in the future, but he will always be proud of his roots in Tavistock.

### OH, THE PLACES WE'LL GO: The ghostly history of the Mermaid Inn

I have staved at some very interesting hotels and inns during my years as a travel writer. But I have to admit, this was the first time I booked in at an establishment that boasts that it was rebuilt... in 1420.

We were on the last leg of our 22-person tour of southern England, and I had opted to stay in the ancient town of Rve.

I love Rve, for a number of reasons. It is replete with historic buildings; it has a storied past of smuggling and other sea-side shenanigans; its cobblestone streets are authentic and original; its pubs are the real deal.

I have stayed in Rye a number of times, but always at a bed and breakfast, but with a group of this size, we needed something bigger. I had often walked past the Mermaid Inn, and had even ducked in for a look around, but had never stayed there.

We decided to take the chance on a hotel that brags that it was rebuilt over 600 years ago - although bits were added two hundred years later, making those parts practically modern.

And our stay at the Mermaid was entirely wonderful, from the unique rooms to the great food to the terrific service.

There was one hitch - our fullsized coach could not get anywhere near the Inn. But the folks at the Mermaid offered to meet us at a parking lot a couple of blocks away, and transport our luggage up the cobblestone streets to the Inn. Turned out, they also offered rides to anyone in the group who opted not to walk. One of the drivers was a friendly woman named Judith.

As we were checking in, Judith called me aside and asked if the group would like an introduction and a bit of a tour of our new well, very old - home away from home. It soon became apparent why she knew all this stuff - our "driver" was Judith Blincow, who has worked at the Mermaid since she was 18 years told, and who now owns the place.

All the rooms in the Mermaid are unique, all are historic (although with state of the art updates like wifi), and many come with apparently authenticated ghost stories!

According to a "fact" sheet handed out to guests, Mermaid's Room 16 was the location of duels by sword, resulting in the death of one of the combatants, who was thrown down the stairs to the area that is now the bar. Modern-day guests have reported ghostly duels right in their bedroom. Guests in Room 5 report a "Lady in White" visiting them. In Room 10, a family of three was

seen to walk through a wall. Judith delights in recounting these and many more stories – it seems that many of the hotel's 31 rooms come with spectral roommates.

Then Judith took us to the basement - a series of vaults with Norman arches, dating back as least as far as the 1100's, and today used for storage and as a wine cellar. But - Rye being a smugglers' haven – there is clear evidence of tunnels under the basement floor, and archaeologists continue to study this, the most ancient part of the Inn. Judith says there are rumours of treasure, and she is confident it will be found.

Our group had booked a lounge for a convivial "happy hour"; the walls were decorated with dark wood, including one panel that, on examination, appeared different from the rest. Its decorations turned out to be subtly carved symbols and icons representing the Roman Catholic faith - because Catholics fleeing the ardent Protestants of the Henry VIII era staved at the Inn. and could worship in this temporary "chapel" - or, as Judith said, a church hidden in plain sight.

I had chosen Rye as our final home base on our visit to the south of England because it is an easy drive from there to wonderful sites including Dover Castle, Sissinghurst Castle Gardens, Winston Churchill's Chartwell, Canterbury, and more.

But the truth is, our stay in the Mermaid Inn was as interesting as visiting any of those interesting destinations. I don't believe I saw any ghosts, although we did

spot an elderly man dressed in period clothes having a pint in the Giant's Fireplace Bar. Having never talked to a ghost, in person, I struck up a conversation with him, and I'm pretty sure he was a present day resident of Rye portraying a fictional smuggler known as Dr. Syn. At least, I'm fairly sure he was real. Although he did disappear, eventually.

The Mermaid Inn has had connections with figures like William Shakespeare - a friend of a one-time landlord, and a visitor and performer in Rye in his day as well as Queen Elizabeth I, and the more modern author. Henry James, whose house - now a National Trust site - is just around the corner.

Rve is full of unique shops and eateries - including Simon the Pieman, a two minute walk from the Mermaid Inn, occasionally frequented by Paul McCartney. Who is definitely not a ghost, despite the "Paul is dead" rumours that abounded - even without social media - in 1969.

I know - that reference dates me. But even I felt young, staying in an Inn renovated as recently as 1420!

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
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
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
